You Can Make A Difference In The Town of Monroe

At the 2020 General Election on November 3rd, the positions of MAYOR and three CITY COUNCILORS will appear on the ballot. Monroe is a wonderful community to live in and serving on the City Council is an opportunity to give back to the town by listening respectfully and weigh differing opinions. It is a chance to look at what is best for the whole town of Monroe.

All positions are non-partisan and volunteer/non-paid. Terms begin in January 2021. The Mayor's term is for two years, and the City Councilor's term is four years. The City Council regular meetings are scheduled for the 4th Monday of each month, unless otherwise modified due to holidays or other issues.

To qualify as a candidate for office you must have resided within the City during the twelve months immediately prior to the election and be a registered voter for that same period of time within the City of Monroe. Each candidate must complete Form SEL 101 by August 25, 2020 and return it to City Hall. FIREWORKS SAFETY

Promote & Practice the FOUR BEs

BE Prepared:

- Store fireworks out of children's reach.
- Always read and follow label directions.
- Place pets indoors; they are easily frightened by fireworks.
- Always have water handy (a garden hose or a bucket of water).

BE Responsible:

- Soak used fireworks thoroughly in a bucket of water.
- Dispose of used fireworks & debris properly.
- Never re-light "dud" fireworks. Wait 15-20 minutes then soak it in a bucket of water.

BE Safe:

- An adult should always light fireworks.
- Keep matches & lighters away from children.
- Use fireworks outdoors only.
- Light only one firework at a time & move away quickly.
- Keep children & pets away from fireworks.
- Always remember do not throw fireworks or hold them in your hand.

BE Aware:

- Use only legal fireworks.
- Use fireworks only in legal places.
- Fireworks are prohibited on all beaches, state parks, and state or federal forest lands.
